- * Multi-literacies/rich media



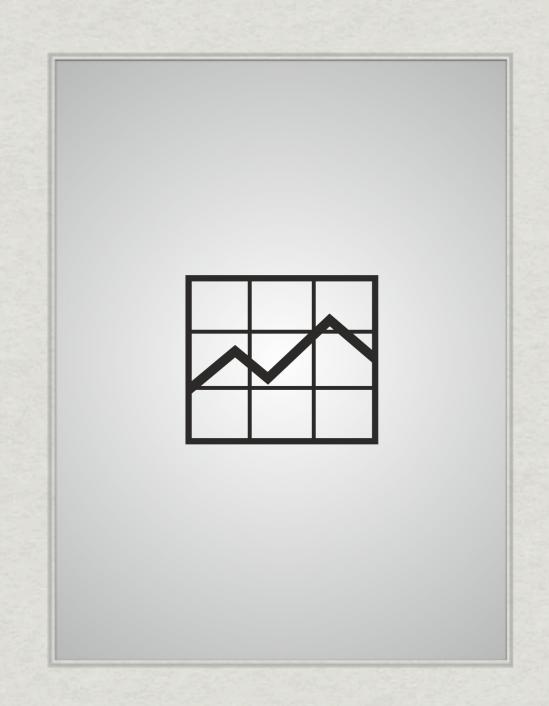
Why?

Research

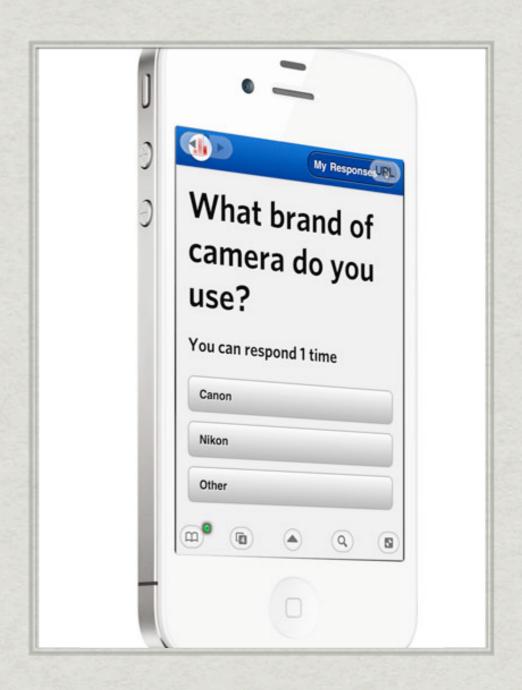
- * 88% of adults in the US have a mobile phone
